inally, I'm back, I said to myself, while walking through the Entebbe International Airport. "I'm back in the motherland!" Even more exhilarating, I had returned to Uganda, the pearl of Africa. The long wait was officially over!

I love the nation of Uganda. The lush tropical foliage reminds me of Grenada, the land of my birth. One can enjoy an adventurous rafting trip down the Nile River or enjoy the coveted wild- life during a safari in Queen Elizabeth National Park.

The Ugandan culture is rich and flavorful, and the people, industrious, gentle, and hospitable. They will go the extra mile in service, to make their guests feel welcome. Everywhere we went, we were greeted with an intentional and genuine warmth and courtesy, which was extremely refreshing.

On day two, after settling in, Dave and I visited a small home for disabled children called Daughters of Charity. We brought food and supplies to the students and staff. Although a familiar visit, it was one filled with an array of emotions.

Over the next three days, the reality began to sink in: forty-two million people call Uganda their home! The vastness of the needs in this country can create a sense of helplessness, which can then lead to thoughts of discouragement. How great of an impact are we making? Can my giving change a country this large, with so many needs? Are we making a significant difference?

I knew the answers to these questions, but even I too had moments of struggle, in light of such harsh realities. That was until day eight, when we visited the home of a woman, who will remain anonymous. Four years ago when we first met her, she was an abused Muslim woman, living with her two daughters and one son, in a tiny dilapidated shack in the slums.

Although her voice was taken, her light was not completely snuffed out. Obviously, this woman was determined to

do better for herself and her family. I saw strength in her effervescent smile, and despite her bleak circumstances, her joy was contagious.

Now, four years later...

This woman has a new home built by the Hoffman Family Foundation. We were able to enjoy a tasty meal in her living room! She owns land, goats, and chickens, and is a proud business owner. Most importantly.....she has become a Christian who loves Jesus! I was delighted, what a testimony!

I was further impressed during a conversation with her twenty-one year old son, whom we had also met four years earlier. During our talk, he expressed his gratitude for Tami and Dave, saying, "You guys gave us hope! Thank you for caring and believing in us!" Then he continued, "Pastor Kelvin, I completed school and I'm now working full-time. I am able to support my mother and sisters. We are self-sustainable!"

God spoke to me in that moment about the sacredness of one soul. "Kelvin, in the Kingdom of God the one matters." It was reassuring. Yes, our God will leave the ninety-nine to seek out that one lost sheep (Luke 15:3–7).

What we do does matter! One soul matters.

Our prayers and giving impact the Ugandan people. We are helping to make a difference in the life of one person, one family, and one village at a time. You and I may not change 42 million Ugandan lives, but that does not diminish the overwhelming significance being made in the lives of so many precious children and families within this village. And while you may not live here, your prayers and contributions are the loving hands that help to create sustainable changes in the Kingdom.

Help ONE. Touch ONE. Love ONE. Focus on reaching ONE. Make a difference in the life of ONE person today!

ne of my most memorable hobbies as a teenager was growing kitchen gardens. I enjoyed planting and nurturing a variety of vegetables, such as tomatoes, peppers, beans, carrots, lettuce, eggplant, okra, to name a few. I welcomed the challenge of implementing whatever I had learned from my agricultural science class.

My greatest concern, however, was the protection of my crops from stray dogs, goats, sheep and chickens. They were everywhere! In response to these growing threats, fences were erected around the parameters to secure my gardens.

Those experiences reminded me of how necessary fences are for the purpose of creating a boundary to protect what's valuable to us. Not only do they protect our material possessions, but they also protect human life, thereby giving us a sense of security. Fences are good!

However, during my recent trip to Uganda, I was impacted by an experience that caused me to view fences in a different light.

On this particular day, Dave and I attended the Rays of Grace Primary School's End-of-year Thanksgiving celebration, a day filled with many festivities. The students sang songs, recited poetry, and performed their traditional folk dances. Scattered throughout the 8 acre compound were over 800 people in attendance. Invited guests included dignitaries from the surrounding community, as well as government officials. Every aspect of this event was outstanding.

In the midst of such a glorious occasion, a particular image caught my attention. Looking out towards the very back of the school, there were children gathered behind the chain-linked fence. This group consisted of approximately fifteen to twenty boys and girls, ranging in age from toddler to pre-teen. Their innocent faces were pressed against the gray-wired fence in a way that remained a memorable fixture in my mind.

Naturally, these wired fences were placed there for good reasons. These fences protect the compound, including its classrooms, library, computer lab, clinic, dorms, teachers' quarters, kitchen, and much more. Robert Kiwanuka, our HFF Uganda Director has also installed cameras and 24-hour guards. More importantly, these fencing and security measures are there to protect our 450 students and staff. It's inarguable that securing these lives is of paramount importance.

As I observed these eager faces, peering from the other side, my heart was moved with compassion. Yet, it was clear that they were not just being barred by a visible fence. Instead, what prevented them from joining the Rays of Grace students was simply a lack of funds. It pained me to watch these kids, longing to be a part of all that was going on, yet unable.

Despite the fact that this kind of situation cannot be remedied by a mere removal of a physical structure, it is not at all hopeless. With the right opportunity and education, I know that any one of these children can grow up to become a nurse, doctor, teacher, pastor, or any contributing member of society. The possibilities are limitless.

What if you and I could help remove these financial 'barriers' and allow these children to experience a better opportunity? What if you and I could impact the life of one child through our prayers and our giving?

Rays of Grace school is now part of the local community and we are supported by the people and families that are in the area. We are here to love, serve and bless these children and this community

The teachers and staff at the school are the backbone of this operation. These teachers really care about our children and work continuously to prepare them for the next steps in education. A big "THANK YOU" to our dedicated teachers for your service, together with all the different supporters, the house mothers, cooking staff, and the administration. I am thankful that we are building a better environment for learning, loving, and being in community.

I was able to have some time with our Women's Empowerment Group. I am so proud of these ladies that are changing their families lives and also their community. The

To Provide Christian Principles To Live By.









MEET MUKASA

When I grow up, I want to be a pro-soccer player and an engineer.

Age: 10 Birthyear: 2010

Mukasa is the oldest of his five sibilings at just 10 years old. Tragically, their family lost their mother while giving birth in 2018, and have been abandoned by their father. During this time, a soccer coach found Mukasa living on the streets of Kampala, homeless and forgotten. This coach took him to his home and taught him how to play soccer and was presented an opportunity to join the Rays of Grace boys soccer team in 2017.

Mukasa would so love to have a Guardian Angel family to not only walk alongside him as he grows up, but to connect with and to help him to achieve his dream of becoming a professional soccer player and an engineer.



OUR NEXT PROJECTS

CURRENT PROJECTS UNDER CONSTRUCTION:

Our second floor Nursery/Pre-School/ Kindergarten is well on its way to completion. And the children will be transitioning to their new facility this year. We are grateful for the funding that God has blessed us with to accomplish this project.

We are now checking out equipment for the playground. This will be a fun place that will be filled with love and laughter. And maybe a few giraffes....??

We were also blessed with starting our project for the teachers housing. This will help facilitate our teachers with a nice place to live and be an added benefit to teaching at Rays of Grace.

OUR NEXT PROJECT: OUR NEW DORMITORY

Thank you for all of you who have graciously helped us with these projects. As you know we still have too many children that are outside of the fences. In 2016 we were able to build a dormitory which houses approximately 150 children. We are now in desperate need of building a second dormitory. We will make the first dormitory boys only and the second dormitory will be for girls.

The project is estimated at \$125,000.

Our boarding children excel when living on campus. They come to school each day, they have a daily shower, they have three healthy meals, and a soft bed at night to sleep.

I have found that helping others is one of the simplest ways of finding joy and fulfillment. Life doesn't get better than this.
